
Location & Service Area






Sandra Gaspard 1973 - 2017







- Available Loan Dollars for lending as of March 31, 2017
- Original Government Contribution


Value of Loans (\$) at March 31, 2017




Community Economic Development



CED Projects

Rural Advisory Council

Debra Arnott, General Manager was one of 14 individuals to be appointed to the Rural Advisory Council for the Province. The mandate of the council is to provide input to government policy decisions to best support thriving rural

communities, while keeping in mind government's need to control spending and ensure an overall balanced budget for the Province.

The initial focus for the council will be to provide advice on rural economic development, including rural access to capital and business development support for rural entrepreneurs and businesses. The council will also advise on rural community capacity building, including the Rural Dividend Program.

Venture Connect

Over the next few years nearly 25% of all BC Businesses will end up on the market for sale. The current population growth and demographics will no longer support the number of businesses that will be for sale. This shortage is expected to last for a couple of decades and will put many rural communities at risk.

Communities Futures has partnered with Venture Connect to assist business owners to prepare for successful sale and continuity of business in their communities. This partnership will improve communications and create new linkages to potential buyers in groups most likely to buy B.C. businesses, including immigrants, young people and vacationers aged 50 and over. This program has created an electronic publication that highlight businesses for sale in B.C. matching sellers to buyers. Generally it can take 1-3 years to complete a good exit and 83% of

small business owners don't plan their exit until they are ready to leave. To help entrepreneurs become aware of these succession planning workshops that are offered throughout our region, visit The Venture Connect Website http://www.ventureconnect.ca these seminars provided business owners with the tools to be prepared and help plan for a good exit.






MCABEE FOSSIL BEDS HERITAGE SITE

Introduction:

McAbee Fossil Beds Heritage Site is a 548 hectare site located adjacent to Highway 1, 13 kilometres east of Cache Creek. For the past 14 months the Community Futures Sun Country has been a member of the McAbee Fossil Beds Heritage Site Working Group. The purpose of this report is to provide the Community Futures Sun Country Board, and the communities it serves, a document that provides the McAbee site history, potential opportunities and steps to moving forward. This briefing note only provides a high-level overview. Supplementary documents are available for those wishing greater details.

History/Background:

The McAbee Fossil Beds Heritage Site (the McAbee site) is part of an ancient lake bed which was deposited approximately 52 million years ago, and is internationally recognized for the diversity of plant, insect, and fish fossils found within. First recorded discovery came in the 1900s by G.M Dawson. This was followed by Len Hill in the 1970s, then by David Langevin who staked a mineral claim in 1991. Bruce Archibald began his research into the McAbee Fossil Bed in the 1990s and remains the site's leading expert.

Research in the early 2000s provided a greater insight into the significance of the McAbee site and in 2009 the province funded a geological and paleontological survey report. That report identified the fossil beds' extent and provided a wealth of technical information for amateur and professional paleontologists. The significant heritage value of the McAbee site include paleontological, geological, archaeological, cultural and social. The significance of the McAbee site is rooted in the quality and diversity of the fossils found, as well as its geology, history, and the exceptional natural values of the setting.

A number of people have been involved in this project. Founding partners and members of The Advisory Team include representatives from: the Heritage Branch, Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, Royal BC Museum, and the Faculty of Science at Thompson Rivers University. Joining this group are representatives from: the Faculty of Adventure, Culinary Arts and Tourism, Thompson Rivers University; Dr Bruce Archibald and a Consulting Geologist.

In early 2012, a community stakeholder group became focused on the preservation of the McAbee site and on July 18, 2012, the McAbee site received Heritage Designation as a Provincial Heritage Site under section 23 of the Heritage Conservation Act. The designation ensures that the site is protected in the long-term and enables further research, education and development opportunities consistent with its primary heritage values.

To determine the potential of the McAbee site for educational and tourism activities, along with the continued research, a pre-feasibility study was completed in 2013. Community members took the next step in 2014 and prepared a Vision and Guiding Principles for the development of the Site, and in 2015 a tourism workshop was organized by Gold Country Communities Society to help identify potential tourism opportunities.

A McAbee Site Working Group was formed and convened its first meeting on May 16, 2016. The Group included Bonaparte Indian Band, Community Futures Sun Country, Gold Country Communities Society, Thompson Nicola Regional District, Tourism Kamloops, Village of Cache Creek, Village of Ashcroft, and Walhachin Museum. To help further develop the concept, Debra Arnott facilitated a visioning workshop with the Working Group June 29, 2016. With support from MLA Tegart, the visioning workshop outcomes were then presented by Debra Arnott to Richard Linzey, Director Heritage Branch FLNR. Further Research of the US Fossil Centres was also completed to understand the potential opportunity for the Site.

Community Futures Sun Country received \$10,000.00 funding from the Rural Dividend Fund to complete a Business Case and Plan. In February 2017, Community Futures Sun Country engaged consultant ATW Associates Inc. to assist the Working Group in development of the plan. Community Futures Sun Country contributed an additional \$2,202.00 to the contract cost for the consultant to complete one-on-one interviews. The final report was presented by Debra Arnott to the following communities and organizations: District of Logan Lake; Village of Ashcroft; Village of Cache Creek; Village of Clinton; District of Lillooet Chamber of Commerce; Gold Country Communities Society; Hat Creek Ranch Board of Directors and the Cariboo Chilcotin Coast Tourism Association.

Community Futures Sun Country has been deeply involved in the process for the past year. In-kind support of staff time, travel and office equipment is estimated at \$7,000.00 to date.

Business Case / Plan Highlights:

There has been overwhelming support for establishing an interpretive centre from all partners that include affected communities, Indigenous Peoples and other stakeholders. Stakeholder Groups include: research, science, education, culture, communities, heritage site, tourism, and Indigenous Peoples.

The consultant reviewed all documents compiled to date, conducted market and socio-economic profiles of visitor impact of the surrounding area, research of selected fossil peer museums and science centre operations. Also reviewed were the strategic plans of selected communities, Indigenous People, tourism agencies and heritage site operations. The consultant also completed 23 one-on-one interviews with partners, stakeholders and museum experts.

The Business Case identifies the multiple assets of the McAbee site for research, education and tourism opportunities. A market analysis of the region, and comparative research of other fossil and museum facilities, suggests that the McAbee site has the potential to attract 50,000 visitors per year and generate up to \$6.9 million per year in direct spending in the Kamloops/Gold Country area. To achieve this potential opportunity, the Business Plan provides a phased in approach to the site's development. That approach begins in the years 2017 and 2018 to have the site visitor and market ready, and have the completion of a World Class Interpretive Centre by the year 2025. Critical success factors identified in the report include community-led, visitor focused programs, long-term vision, financially sustainable, and a detailed governance structure. The Partners, members of the Working Group and the Advisory team are committed to ensure the site is re-opened to the public and managed in a sustainable and economically viable way for the benefit of all.

Moving Forward:

Community Futures Sun Country has been approved for funding assistance through the Canada 150 program to fund the development and construction of key aspects, such as: site plan, washroom facilities, temporary shelter, design for interpretive trails, and to drill a well for water. Community Futures Sun Country is leveraging \$10,000.00 for a total project cost of \$61,406.00. The next phase is the development of a Non-Profit Society to move the Business Plan forward. Community Futures Sun Country applied for and received \$1,500 to assist the new Society with cost of registration and other expenses.
